



Week 11 Questions and Answers

In keeping with what Lillian covered at the beginning of the Week 11 session, we asked Dr. Day to only address questions that are directly related to the material covered. Here are those questions raised but not answered during the live session.

Questions are in **BOLD**. Dr. Day's answers follow each question. Names are removed to protect privacy.

Q – Dr. Day, on page 5 of today's lesson, week 11, you mentioned some things the translators added or took away. Would JAMES be an example of this? They took away, Jacob (Ἰάκωβος) and added James. Exp. James 1:1. James, a servant of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ, to the twelve tribes which are scattered abroad, greeting. James is not in the Greek scriptures, right?

I'm sorry, I don't really know what you're talking about. What is the basis for your question? What caused you to think that these two names were substituted? I looked this up in my Interlineal Bible and the word "James" is there.

Q – In the beginning you said we have to Study the Bible. I read, take notes, and review my notes. If that is not studying, please explain how to study.

You also have to use the other resources I talk about in Chapter 3 of my book, "Who Rewrote the Bible?" in order to understand how they have changed the Bible. In that chapter, I spend 15 pages explaining how I study.

Q – In Mark 16:16–20

16 He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned

(this word is not “damned” – it is “Judged”).

17 And these signs shall follow them that believe; In my name shall they cast out devils; they shall speak with new tongues

(This word is not “tongues: – it is languages)

18 They shall take up serpents; and if they drink any deadly thing, it shall not hurt them; they shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover.

19 So then after the Lord had spoken unto them, he was received up into heaven, and sat on the right hand of God.

20 And they went forth, and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them, and confirming the word with signs following. Amen.

Are those miracles still happening these days or what we've seen on Media is ALL pagan's miracles when pastors prayed for the miracle healings?

The Bible tells us that signs and wonders are for the spiritually immature. Jesus did miracles to prove He was the Messiah. If He had healed the sick the way I got well from cancer, no one would have attributed it to Him because He would have already moved on to another location. I discuss the Early and Latter Rain somewhat in the handout. Also, I discuss it in my book, “Getting Started on Getting Well.”

It is just as much of a miracle to reverse one’s cancer by changing everything about his or her life as it was for Jesus to heal the paralyzed man when He was on earth. Because in order to reverse one’s cancer using God’s Natural Health Plan, the miraculous change must occur in the heart: The person has to learn to trust God – completely and do things HIS way – rather than to trust “man” (doctors) and do things their way.

Virtually all of the “miracles” the TV preachers are supposedly doing are completely fake. On one of my DVDs on health, I discuss what they are doing.

Q – What location do they reap what they sew at? (after their death)

Everyone reaps what he sows when he is alive – either during this life on earth, or when he (or she) is resurrected at the Second resurrection, which will be on earth. Heaven is a temporary place. It will be where Jesus takes the righteous at His Second Coming to live with Him for 1,000 years.

At the time of the Great White Throne Judgment – AFTER the millennium, Jesus will come to earth, with the Saints that He took to heaven. It is at that time Jesus will raise the Unsaved (in the Second Resurrection on earth) and after the Judgment, they will begin reaping what they have sown – on earth.

Q – Where will it be at? On the earth?

On earth. No one will be going to heaven to reap what he has sown. The only ones who go to heaven are those who are already perfect. And, “Yes”, we CAN be perfect. God promises to make us perfect. He does that by leading us through all the trials we need to go through to refine our character.

Q – Or does it not say specifically the location in the Bible? And if someone does not have to reap what they sew after their death,

Please see my explanation in my first sentence of my answer above. EVERYONE will have to reap what he or she has sown. But after that reaping is done, and the person recognizes his or her need for Jesus Christ to totally run their life, there is no more need for more “reaping.”

Q – Do they enter the new heaven and wait for the others?

If the person has reaped what he has sown on earth, he or she will go to heaven when Jesus comes. If the person has NOT yet reaped what he has sown, he will die in the great conflagration that will occur at the Second coming of Christ and will be dead for the entire millennium. At that time, he will be Judged at the Great White Throne Judgment and will begin reaping what he has sown – on earth.

When EVERYONE has reaped what they have sown, then God will re-create the earth, and we will enter eternity – which will be lived on this (re-created) earth. As I said before, the Bible tells us that there will be no more oceans: just rivers

and very large lakes. So, there will be plenty of room for everyone who has ever been born.

It is necessary to study Revelation in depth to obtain all the information to put that together.
